Life as a Bulldog is steeped in tradition and history. Founded in 1869, Tougaloo College is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and is often referred to as the “Cradle of the Civil Rights Movement.”

Tougaloo College’s 500-acre campus is located in Jackson on the edge of Madison County. This private, historically black liberal arts institution of higher learning is open to everyone. Students flock to Tougaloo from all over the nation and the world. Most live on campus, and almost all take advantage of Tougaloo’s comprehensive financial aid programs.

Tougaloo College offers bachelor’s degrees in 29 majors in the humanities, natural sciences, social sciences and education programs. Most of the college’s graduates pursue graduate or professional school immediately after completing their bachelor’s degree studies.

“We boast proudly of our achievements, understanding that the true measure of our success is not determined by how well our students do while they matriculate with us, but rather how well they do once they leave our institution and the contributions they make to a larger society,” said Beverly Wade Hogan, president of Tougaloo College.

Even though the school is steeped in history, school administrations are always searching for new technologies to enhance the learning experience. For example, Tougaloo College now offers online learning programs, and the campus is an Internet2 campus with WiFi capabilities.

For three consecutive years, Tougaloo College has been recognized as one of the “Best in the Southeast” in *The Princeton Review’s* list of liberal arts colleges. It is also the only Mississippi institution of higher learning and the only historically black university in the nation to be ranked in the top 20 of liberal arts colleges in the U.S. by *Washington Monthly*.

Several special opportunities at Tougaloo include the early identification program with Brown University’s medical school, the TRIO program, the Jackson Heart Study and the Leadership Institute. Exchange programs at Brown University and New York
